As of 2000, Washington had a population of 1,047, comprised completely of rural residents. The population has increased by 11.7% since 1990. Washington contains more males than females. Approximately 53% of the total population is male, while 47% is female. Table A. shows the breakdown of age groups amongst the total population in Washington. Approximately 27% of the population is children, age 18 and under, while 9% of the population is senior citizens, age 65 and over. The number of residents age 18 and under has decreased throughout the last decade, while the number of residents age 65 and over has increased. There are currently 2.4% less children and 22.8% more senior citizens in Washington than there were in 1990.

Of the total population in Washington, 100% live in households. Of these people, 87% live in family households, while 13% live in nonfamily households. Of the 399 total households in Washington, 73% are family households, while 27% are nonfamily households. Most of the family households contain 2 to 4 persons. Approximately 43% are 2-person households, while 21% are 3-person households, and 24% are 4-person households. All of the nonfamily households contain 1 or 2 persons. Approximately 74% are 1-person households and 26% are 2-person households. Compared to 1990, there are currently 21.3% more households in Washington. Of the 290 total families that reside in Washington, approximately 89% are married-couple families. Of these married-couple families, 39% have children under the age of 18, while 61% do not have children under the age of 18. The remaining 11% of families in Washington fall under the category of other family. See Table C. for details. Approximately 58% of these families have a female householder with no husband present, while 42% have a male householder with no wife present. In total, there are 14.2% more families residing in Washington than there were in 1990.

In Washington, there are 594 workers age 16 and over, which is a 35.9 % increase from 1990. Approximately 14% of these workers work in Washington, while 86% work outside of the community. The majority of workers, 89%, travel to work by car, truck, van, or motorcycle. Approximately 90% of those who travel to work by car, truck, van, or motorcycle drive alone, while 10% use carpools. See Table D. for other means of transportation used by workers in Washington. Although there are a range of travel times for Washington workers, 25% commute between 5 and 19 minutes. Approximately 41% commute between 20 and 39 minutes. Only 4% travel less than 5 minutes to work, while 4% travel more than 90 minutes to work from Washington.

In Washington, there were 266 people attending school at some level in 2000, which is a 62.2% increase from 1990. A range of educational attainment is represented by the population in Washington. Only 0.4% of all residents 25 years and older have not completed any level of schooling, while 51% have only a high school diploma. Approximately 20% of Washington residents 25 years and older hold some type of degree, ranging from an Associates degree to a Doctorate degree. See Table E. for details.

In Washington, there are 636 residents in the labor force, which is 77.3% of the population age 16 and over. This is a 34.2% increase from 1990. Approximately 95% of the people in the civilian labor force are employed, while 5% are unemployed. The 29 residents that are unemployed represent 3.6% more than the unemployment level in 1990, based solely on the raw numbers. All of the industries covered in the Census are represented by residents of Washington. The industries with the largest percentage of workers are: education, health, and social services, which represents 17.2% of employed

residents; retail trade, which represents 14.5% of employed residents; and manufacturing, which represents 12.9% of employed residents. See Table F. for details.

Table G. shows household income and family income data for Washington. All income classes are represented here. Approximately 6% of the total households have an income of less than \$10,000; 16% have an income between \$10,000 and \$25,000; 38% have an income between \$25,000 and \$50,000; 26% have an income between \$50,000 and \$75,000; 11% have an income between \$75,000 and \$100,000; and 3% have an income above \$100,000. In 1999, the median household income in Washington was \$43,125, which is a 53.5% increase from 1990. Approximately 3% of the total families have an income of less than \$10,000; 7% have an income between \$10,000 and \$25,000; 39% have an income between \$25,000 and \$50,000; 35% have an income between \$50,000 and \$75,000; 13% have an income between \$75,000 and \$100,000; and 3% have an income above \$100,000. In 1999, the median family income in Washington was \$50,500, which is a 69.1% increase from 1990. In 1999, the per capita income for Washington was \$18,439, a 60.8% increase from 1990. Approximately 6% of people in Washington for whom poverty status is determined have incomes below poverty level. Fortunately, the 64 residents who have incomes below poverty level are 27.3% less than those who suffered from poverty in 1990.

There are 528 total housing units in Washington, all of which are located in a rural area. This is an 18.1% increase from the total housing units in 1990. Approximately 77% of these housing units are currently occupied, leaving 23% vacant. Of these vacant housing

units, 2% are for rent, while 2% are for sale. Approximately 87% of the vacant housing units are for seasonal, recreational, or occasional use. There are currently 3.4% more housing vacancies in Washington than there were in 1990 and the occupancy level has increased by 23.4% over the last decade. See Table H. for details.

Of the 406 total occupied housing units in Washington, 59% are 1 to 2 person households, while 32% are 3 to 4 person households. Of the 528 total housing units in the Town, most have between 4 and 7 rooms. Approximately 10% have 1 to 2 rooms; 24% have 3 to 4 rooms; 35% have 5 to 6 rooms; 24% have 7 to 8 rooms; and 7% have 9 or more rooms. Many of the housing units in Washington were built prior to 1980. Approximately 23% of the houses were built before 1939; 43% were built between 1940 and 1979; and 34% were built after 1980. Approximately 89% of the total housing units in Washington contain complete plumbing facilities, leaving 11% without adequate plumbing. See Table J. for details.
